

While Greenville's charms are vast, locals agree that you could spend your entire visit on Main Street and never tire of your surroundings. [Insider Tips.](#)



The Eyes of the Horse World on Carolinas



FEI World Equestrian Games™ 2018 will be held at the Tryon International Equestrian Center on September 10-23, 1918.


The FEI World Equestrian Games™ are held every four years in the middle of the Olympic cycle. A huge event on the global sporting calendar, it combines eight world championships at one event – Jumping, Dressage, Para-Equestrian Dressage, Eventing, Driving, Endurance, Vaulting and Reining.

"It's a truly spectacular venue," said Ingmar de Vos, FEI President. "We are looking forward to a fantastic celebration of top level sport as all the disciplines come together to crown their world champions at the Games in two years' time."

Created by Mark Bellissimo in Mill Spring, NC, the Tryon International Equestrian Center covers 1,600 acres, provides 1,200 permanent stables and 12 arenas, seating 12,000 (with VIP seating of 1,500). Hundreds of miles of equestrian trails, plus restaurants, accommodations, retail and resort amenities.

Rose Hill Mansion



You can't simply decide to drive to [Rose Hill Mansion](#) for a visit. This 1850s fully-restored Victorian beauty is a private home which is located within the gated community of Rose Hill Plantation, in Bluffton, SC. Reservations are required.

Before you plan your trip, here are a few tips. Your guides are knowledgeable and entertaining, and although you can't take photos during the tour, it is permissible afterwards. You may also sit on some of the furniture (ask first), and enjoy the magnificent front porch before you leave.

A glass of wine is available before your tour, and special Lowcountry treats are offered before you leave, made by the much-loved Miss Pat, who is writing a cookbook, as we speak.

While there, take a quick look at the foyer bathroom, near the front stairs (an architectural marvel and thing of beauty). According to owner Robin White, the toilet surround had been a fixture within a 19th Century church. The sink is built into a gothic piece of furniture and there are stained glass windows, adding to the appeal. One of her favorite pieces is a gothic clock, but she is also very fond of the card table on display in the entry hall, which was the first original family treasure to come home to Rose Hill.

The Whites met the descendants of the original 19th Century Kirk family (owners) back in 2006, through a connection at their local historic society. They became good friends and the family has given a number of historic items now on display.

Be sure to stop in at the gift shop for treasures including fresh baked goodies - sweet potato pie or bread pudding perhaps.

The Rose Hill Mansion is also available for weddings & corporate event rentals, as well as private scheduled group tours & luncheons. The carriage house, connected to the mansion, can additionally be rented nightly or by the week.

Tickets: \$25.00 per person; \$5.00 for children age 6-12 (accompanied by adult)

Carolina Home Grown



The Good, Bad and Beautiful!

For fall color, sweetgum (*Liquidambar styraciflua*) is hard to beat. Its glossy green star-shaped leaves turn fiery shades of red, orange, yellow, and purple in the fall. This large tough tree is capable of growing 60 to 100 feet high with a spread of 30 to 70 feet, which makes it well-suited for parks, campuses, or residential areas.

Have I told you that it has a naturally strong branch architecture? Did you know that in the animated adventure film, *The Land Before Time*, the treestars consumed by Littlefoot and his clan were sweetgum leaves? (Maybe not, but I convinced my young children.)

Are you sold on sweetgum yet?

I think I forgot one more important drawback that could be a deal-breaker: sweetgum produces a multitude of prickly miniature prickly seed balls that resemble mace-like gumballs.

The "gumballs" mature in the fall when the winged seeds escape from openings in each capsule and are dispersed by the wind. Some seeds escape and germinate in the spring, but others fall prey to finches, squirrels, and other animals. After releasing their seeds the gumballs drop to the ground where they lie in wait for people's unsuspecting bare feet or other tender body parts.

Although gumballs can be a painful nuisance as well as harmful projectiles when launched from the chute of a rotary lawn mower, Guy Sternberg and Jim Wilson, authors of *Native Trees for North American Landscape* (Timber Press, 2004), recommend using gumballs as a mulch in planting beds to deter cats from using them as outdoor litter boxes.

A more permanent solution, however, is to replace your existing trees with a fruitless sweetgum cultivar called 'Rotundiloba.' Fruitless or roundleaf sweetgum has leaves with rounded lobes and a fall color that ranges from a bland yellow to purple. While this fruitless cultivar is not as bold and bodacious as a species of free-range sweetgum, it is free of gumballs, which will make you and your cats happy.
